Stewardship

Who are we?

We are now in the Epiphany season of the Church year. Epiphany means to make evident. The lesson each Sunday show us how Jesus made himself evident to the people as the long promised Messiah who

had come to save them from their sins. The goal of the lessons is to inspire us to also make Jesus evident to people as their Savior. As good stewards using our gifts from God, we let people know what a loving God we serve, a God who loves us best through Jesus. Near the end of the Church year last November, we read a lesson from the prophet Zephaniah. It was very much gloom and doom. The people were not going along with the reforms that good King Josiah was trying to institute to try to get the Jews back to believing in the true God again and obeying his laws. Zephaniah condemned the people for, among other things, wearing "foreign garments."

What was that all about? Moses had commanded the people to sew blue tassels on the corners of their garments that would enable others to identify them as God's people. The rebellious people were wearing garments made by foreigners without the tassels. Those people did not want others to identify them as Jews so that they did not appear to be people who should be obeying God's laws. We saw much the same thing in the gospel lesson that same day. A master (God) gave three servants 5 talents of money, 2 talents of money, and 1 talent of money. Those first two servants went out and showed others what a loving master they had and by spreading that wealth showed others what a loving master they had.

The third servant not only did not want anyone else to see what a loving master he served by not making his wealth known to others. Not only that, he also buried the talent of money so that no one would know that he had anything from his master and so that he would not use it to make more for his master. He wanted to remain anonymous as far as his relationship to God.

The lesson for us as stewards of God is that God has blessed us with the gifts of time, talent, and treasure so that people will see that we are Christians who serve a loving God. Back in the Walther League days, we sang a song that said, "And they will know that we are Christians by our love, by our love." Jesus said much the same thing at the beginning of his Sermon on the Mount. "Let you light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in Heaven."

We are good stewards when we generously share our blessings from God the Holy Spirit to be a blessing to others. When others thank you for your generosity, you can say, "You're welcome. That's what Christians do." We hope that people will see through our love for them that God also loves them. And during the Epiphany season, we see that God wants people to see that he loves them best through his Son, Jesus.

Parish Nurse News

Deep vein thrombosis (DVT) is a common health issue. Each year, approximately 1 to 3 in every 1,000 adults develop a DVT or pulmonary embolism (PE)in the United States, and up to 300,000 people die each year as a result of DVT/PE. It's the third most common vascular disease, behind heart attacks and stroke. At times DVT is triggered by known causes, but it can also occur for no reason. I will be discussing what is a DVT, risk factors, symptoms of a DVT, and one complication of DVT which is pulmonary embolism (PE).

DVT occurs when a blood clot develops in veins deep in your body because your veins are injured or the blood flowing through them is too sluggish. The blood clots may partially or completely block blood flow through your vein. Most DVTs happen in your lower leg, thigh or pelvis, but they also can occur in other parts of your body including your arm, brain, intestines, liver or kidney. The Majority of people who develop DVT are at risk of clots for one or more reasons: 1) Age and lifestyle factors. Older age, obesity and smoking increase your risk of a DVT. 2) Medical factors. These include a past history of DVT/PE, use of hormone therapy or oral contraceptives with estrogen, heart failure, a high risk of heart disease, and cancers particularly pancreatic, brain, lymph node and lung cancers. Also, inflammatory diseases like inflammatory bowel disease and rheumatoid arthritis increase your risk for DVT. 3) Genetic Factors. a number of inherited conditions increase clotting risk, as well as having a family history of DVT or blood clots particularly if they occur before age 50 and without reason can be an indicator. \

In addition to the predisposing factors that increase your risk of DVTs, particular events can trigger a DVT. Even after the event, the risk of DVT can remain elevated for several months. These events include: 1) COVID-19 Infection. The infection increases the risk of clotting if hospitalization is required. 2) Long periods of immobilization or bedrest. Inactivity slows blood flow. Airplane flights more than 6-8 hours can slightly increase risk of clots. 3) Trauma or major surgery. Depending on the type of surgery or injury and its duration can increase the risk of blood clots. Leg, hip or pelvis fractures as well as orthopedic surgeries in particular increase clotting risk. DVT can form and grow unnoticed, but symptoms develop in most people, usually in just one leg. Symptoms include: 1) Swelling in the legs. 2) Leg pain, cramping or a pulling that starts in the calf but may occur in the thigh. 3) Warmth or redness over the affected area, particularly if superficial veins nearer the skin surface are involved. 4) Increased prominence of leg veins. It is imperative to get symptoms checked out, even though approximately only 10-25% of people with these symptoms really have a DVT, because a lot of other health problems cause the same symptoms.

If you develop symptoms of a PE — a life-threatening complication of deep vein thrombosis — seek emergency medical help. PE occurs when a blood clot gets stuck in an artery in the lung, blocking blood flow to part of the lung. Blood clots most often start in the legs and travel up through the right side of the heart and into the lungs. The warning signs and symptoms of a pulmonary embolism include: Sudden shortness of breath, chest pain or discomfort that gets worse when you take a deep breath or cough, feeling lightheaded or dizzy, fainting, rapid pulse or breathing and coughing up blood.
