### From The Pastor

"Lenten Wanderings"

As we've already begun the season of Lent back on February 22nd for Ash Wednesday, we continue our way to the cross. As we do so every Lent, when it comes to this journey to the cross, I can't help but think of the journeys and wandering that God's Old Testament people did in the wilderness. From the very beginning when God first called Abraham from out of the wilderness to journey with Him up until the very temptations of Jesus in the wilderness, God's people have been seen wandering. This wandering often centered around their journeys through the wilderness as they looked to make their way to the Promised Land. However, their journeys also seemed to center on their disobedience and sin, along with the many times when they abandoned God and turned towards relying upon themselves. It's in these moments that God's people drove themselves further and further into the wilderness of sin, death, and destruction, isolating themselves from God.

As we think about these "wandering" events from God's Word, we need to take a hard look at ourselves in the mirror, as well. # Stewardship

#### "LOV3"

The letters L, O, and V plus the number 3 do not make a word. However, if you reverse the 3, it will be a good imitation of the letter E and give you the word LOVE. We Americans like to change things around like this so that we can combine a concept and a person or thing to which the concept applies. In this case, LOV3 is meant to get us to love Damar Hamlin. Damar Hamlin is a Buffalo Bills football player who was seriously injured on the field in a game between Buffalo and the Cincinnati Bengals. He was so seriously hurt that an ambulance had to come onto the playing field and rush him off to a nearby hospital. Damar's jersey number is 3 so that LOV3 indicated that we should show our love for Damar by praying for him. Football fans also brought flowers and candles to the hospital where he was being treated. Damar survived and is on his way to recovery. You have to know the whole story so that you can see love in LOV3.

God also showed his love for us in a strange way. God the Father sent his Son Jesus into the world as a man so that God himself could die publicly on a cross for all the world to see the love of God for us.

God did not just say up in Heaven that he loved us, but he demonstrated that love for us down here on Earth. To the world, the public death of Jesus on a cross does not convey any thoughts of love. On the contrary, death on a cross conveys the ultimate punishment for some crime. It is only through the eyes of faith that we see that the death of Jesus on the cross shows us God's great love for all of us humans.

We are now in the season of Lent. During Lent, we are reminded that we humans are sinners. And, "the wages of sin is death." Not only will we die here in this world because we are sinners, God has also said that we deserve to die eternally in Hell because we are sinners. But in his great love for us, God sent his Son Jesus into our world to save us from this second death. It's just that God saved us in a way that is not readily recognizable to us, just as LOV3 is not readily recognizable.

Jesus did not sin. Therefore, Jesus did not deserve to die. But Jesus, the second person of the Godhead, became a man so that God himself could die in our place. Jesus was also God so that he was able to die for all humans who ever existed. Jesus died because he took the guilt of all the sins of all of us humans upon himself. Because Jesus died in our place, God was able to show his great love for us and to forgive us our sins. Having accomplished God's mission to save all people from the second death, Jesus rose from the dead and ascended back into Heaven. Now God has left the work of showing people the love of God by sending us believers out into the world to love others. God has equipped us for this unusual work of loving others by making us stewards of time, talent and treasure so that we have the resources to love others. Nowadays, love for the downtrodden and the hurting is still an unexpected gift to someone. But just as God's love came to us in an unexpected way through the death of Jesus on the cross, God wants us to be good stewards by unexpectedly loving others with the hope that they will also see the love of God for them in Jesus.

### Parish Nurse News

Last month I started discussing opioids and correct use of them for pain control as opioid addiction has destroyed countless lives. This month I am continuing the discussion on opioids. I will be looking at the right dose of opioids which is safe, the right length of treatment as opioids are not meant for long-term use, and the new ways available to help with prescribing opioids.

The right dose. Opioids come in many different doses. Of course the higher the dose, the greater the pain relief. However, the higher the dose, the risk of complications increases. Most of the time, people start on a low dose and go to a higher dose, only if necessary. If a person has been taking an opioid for a long time and the form of the drug is being changed, the new dose is generally decreased to reduce the risk of problems, like an overdose.

To ensure the safest dose: Do not ever increase the dose of your opioid without talking to your doctor. Even small dose changes can be dangerous. Do not take the opioid more often than ordered. Such as taking the opioid every 3 hours when it is ordered every 4 hours. This increases the cumulative dose you take, which can be life-threatening. In hospice care the dosage will need to be increased due to the patient's tolerance of the medication, which means that it takes more medication as time goes on to relieve pain/shortness of breath.

This does not mean that the person is addicted. Addiction is considered a brain disorder, because it involves functional changes to brain circuits involved in reward, stress, and self-control.

The right length of treatment. Health care providers ought to prescribe opioids for the shortest period of time required to manage pain. As a rule they stop prescribing opioids as soon as other medications and forms of treatment are effective. Research reveals the following regarding treatment length with opioids: 1) The longer a person takes an opioid, the higher the risk of overdose and addiction. 2) A small quantity prescription decreases the risk that opioids in the home will be available to other people. 3) Over prescription of opioids has contributed to escalating the community opioid supply. This is directly associated with increasing national trends in addiction and overdose. 4) The longer the treatment with opioids, the greater the effects on a person's cardiovascular, gastrointestinal, respiratory, endocrine, immune and central nervous system.

It's a complex decision. Prescribing an opioid is not a simple determination. Cautious deliberation is needed to make a customized recommendation for each person. It is critical to educate someone with an opioid prescription regarding side effects, addiction and overdose dangers, safe storage and eventual disposal. Current advances in pharmacogenomic gene testing can be done to determine who opioids are processed by different people. Then companies that specialize in this technology give people a list of medications that are most likely to be tolerated and those to avoid.

Unfortunately, pharmacogenomic testing is not available everywhere, but some providers contract with outside companies to do the testing. Cost of the testing based on the test that was done. Some insurance policies may cover the testing, so it is recommended that you check with your insurance provider regarding your coverage prior to testing.
