### A Groundhog and Jesus

Of all the holidays we celebrate as a nation I've always been intrigued with Groundhog Day. Since I was a little kid, when February 2 rolled along, I was glued to the television set as the entire nation turned its attention to a groundhog named Punxsutawney Phil. Now, if you somehow aren't acquainted with this yearly tradition, legend has it that if Phil sees his shadow on February 2, the winter chill will continue. On the other hand, if the weather is cloudy and he doesn't see his shadow, we can expect warmer temperatures and early spring. So, how accurate is Phil in predicting the future? Honestly, I don't know. Still, if Phil doesn't see his shadow that day, my sudden interest in dusting off the golf clubs greatly increases.

So why do I bring up Phil? Well, as strange as this may sound, I see a little similarity between the events that take place every February 2 in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania and the events that took place a little over 2,000 years ago in Jerusalem.

As I mentioned above, every year people sit in anticipation waiting to see if Phil will see his shadow. If he doesn't great, an early spring. Two thousand years ago a group of women went to a tomb. ### Good Stewardship Helps Make Jesus Known

We are in the Church Season of Epiphany. Epiphany means to shine a light on something or to enlighten someone about something. The lessons in church during this season have the goal of our showing others that God wants us Christians to enlighten people about Jesus. Witnessing to Jesus is the main work that God has called us Christians to do. God wants us Christians to glorify God by showing others how through Jesus God loves people.

On the first Sunday after Epiphany (January 6<sup>th</sup>), the Sunday lessons speak about the baptism of Jesus. This is the first time that Jesus presented himself publically to the people.

But Jesus did not go immediately from his being baptized to his being crucified. Instead, he wandered around the countryside from the far northern areas of Judea to Jerusalem itself. Jesus did this over a period of three years so that he could have contact with the people so that he could give people a chance to see who he was and to come to faith in him. He hoped that they would see that he was the Messiah that God had long promised to send to them.

On the one hand, Martin Luther said that our God is a hidden God. God hides himself in the Word of God and the sacraments, and we as Christians believe that there is more to the three means of grace than just earthly things. God also hid himself in a man named Jesus, who died on a cross as an ordinary thief. But through the eyes of faith, we Christians see that Jesus dying on the cross is God himself loving us and saving us. To this day, God remains hidden to many people.

On the other hand, when Jesus traveled around the countryside, he had with him a group of disciples. The disciples showed the people that there were people who believed in Jesus. The opinion of the disciples differed from the opinion of most of the people. The disciples saw that Jesus was the Christ, the son of the Living God.

We are like the disciples since it is our job to elicit an opinion about Jesus from the people whom we come into contact so that we can let them know that we believe that Jesus is our Savior. Our talking about Jesus as our Savior gives the Holy Spirit an opportunity to create faith in the person to whom we confess our faith in Jesus.

God gives us Christian stewards time, talent, and treasure so that we can use these gifts from the Holy Spirit to do God's work here in this world as long as we live. The stewardship gift most connected to witnessing is time. Are you willing to take the time to talk to a person and find out what he or she thinks about Jesus? "I believe that Jesus is my Savior from sin. How do you feel about Jesus?"

God has richly blessed us his stewards so that we can help others to have an epiphany and come to saving faith in Jesus Christ.

<u>Note 1</u>: 2020 Giving includes offerings during Worship and payments received in Church Office through the end of December. Values do not include special fund donations to ministries such as We Care, the Food Pantry, the Vineyard Fund, the Youth Group, and building projects. These donations were approximately \$425 per week through December 2020. Other sources of funds, such as outside contributions, Memorials, refunds, rebates, and transfers from the Congregational Fund, are also not included in the amounts.

<u>Note 2</u>: 2020 attendance per week includes only in-person attendance. Comparable online attendance figures are not available for livestreamed services. Online attendance since live streaming began on March 29 ranged from approximately 14 to 53. 'Views' of recorded services ranged from 88 to 627.

<u>Note 3</u>: Budget figures are included as a comparison because the budget was the estimated amount voted on by the Congregation Membership to meet the Congregation's financial requirements during the year. Actual expenditures are available in the monthly accounting report distributed by the Treasurer.

<u>Note 4</u>: Thee amounts are presented for comparison purposes only. Our individual giving amount should be based on being faithful to the Lord so that we return a generous amount of the gifts He gave us.

## SUBJECT TO CHANGE

### Hi from your Parish Nurse!

Did you know that more than 37 million people in the United States may have chronic kidney disease (CKD)? Also, almost 1 in 3 people with diabetes have CKD! This month and next month I will be discussing CKD, how the kidneys work, who is at risk for CKD, what are the symptoms of CKD, does CKD cause other health problems and what happens if my kidneys fail.

Your kidneys are 2 bean shaped organs just under your rib cage on each side of your spine. The kidneys' principal job is to filer extra water and wastes out of your blood stream to make urine. Your kidneys filter 30-50 gallons of blood each day! To keep your body working correctly, the kidneys stabilize the salts and minerals – such as calcium, phosphorus, sodium and potassium that circulate in the blood. The kidneys also produce hormones that assist in controlling blood pressure, make red blood cells and keep your bones strong.

CKD refers to decreased kidney function that extends over 3 months or more. It has many different stages. In the early to middle stages of the disease, an assessment by a kidney doctor could reveal an underlying cause of the CKD that may be correctable, restoring kidney function or steps can be taken to protect the remaining kidney function, so you can maintain a fairly normal life and life span. Your kidneys are amid the most industrious organs of the body with an abundant amount of work capacity so they can function effectively during the earlier stages of mounting damage. Subsequently, CKD frequently goes unnoticed, leaving you with significant kidney damage when finally diagnosed. You can protect your kidneys from further damage and prevent the disease worsening to the point of kidney failure by taking appropriate steps early.

First, I would like to discuss who is more likely to develop CKD. You are at risk for CKD if you have 1) Diabetes. This is the leading cause of CKD. High blood glucose or blood sugar from diabetes can damage blood vessels in your kidneys. 2) High Blood Pressure (BP). High BP is the second leading cause of CKD. Like high blood sugar, high BP can damage blood vessels in your kidneys as well. Almost 1 in 5 of adults with high BP has CKD. 3) Heart disease. Research demonstrates a link between kidney disease and heart disease. People with heart disease are at higher risk for kidney disease and vice versa. Researchers are working to improve the understanding of the relationships between kidney and heart disease. 4) Family history of kidney failure. If your mother, father, sister or brother has kidney failure you are at risk for CKD. It does tend to run in families. If you have kidney disease urge your family members to get tested. Your chances of having kidney disease increase with the age. Also, the longer you have had diabetes, high BP, or heart disease, the likelihood of having kidney disease increases and Americans. Hispanics and American Indians tend to have a higher risk of CKD mostly due to higher rates of diabetes and high BP among these groups. Scientists are studying other possible reasons for this increased risk.

What are the early symptoms of CKD? Early CKD may not have any symptoms. You might wonder how you could have CKD and feel fine. For instance, you can donate one kidney and remain healthy. You can also have kidney damage without any symptoms, since despite the damage to your kidneys, they continue to do enough work to keep you feeling fine. For most people, the only way to know if you have CKD is to get your kidney function checked with blood and urine tests.

As kidney disease progresses, a person may have swelling or edema which occurs when the kidneys can't get rid of the extra fluid and salt. Edema can show up in the legs, feet, or ankles, and sometimes in the hands or face. Symptoms of advance CKD include chest pain, dry skin, itching or numbness, feeling tired, headaches, increased or decreased urination, loss of appetite, muscle cramps, nausea, shortness of breath, sleep problems, difficulty concentrating, vomiting and weight loss.
