The Pentecost Season of Servanthood

May 30th is Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost Sunday celebrates the beginning of the second half of the Church year, the Beginning of the Pentecost season, and the beginning of what God expects us Christians, his servants, to be doing for him.

The first half of the Church year showed us all that Jesus did for us as the Servant of God. How in the second half of the Church year, we will see in each Sunday's lessons what God wants us servants to be doing for him.

In the first half of the Church year, we saw how the Holy Spirit impregnated Mary so that Jesus could be God's servant here on Earth as a man. We also saw Jesus made known to the people as God's servant, Jesus suffer, Jesus die, and Jesus rise from the dead.

Similarly, the Holy Spirit, at our baptism, made us a new creation, God's servant here on Earth. As God's servants, we can also expect that we might suffer and die, as did the martyrs of old and as do some modern-day Christians nowadays. But we are all willing to put our lives on the line because we have a sure hope of a resurrection from the dead because we believe in the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. We are not afraid to die. We have courage to do God's work.

As stewards of God, we acknowledge that everything that we have comes from God, not only for our own use and welfare, but also for the welfare of others.

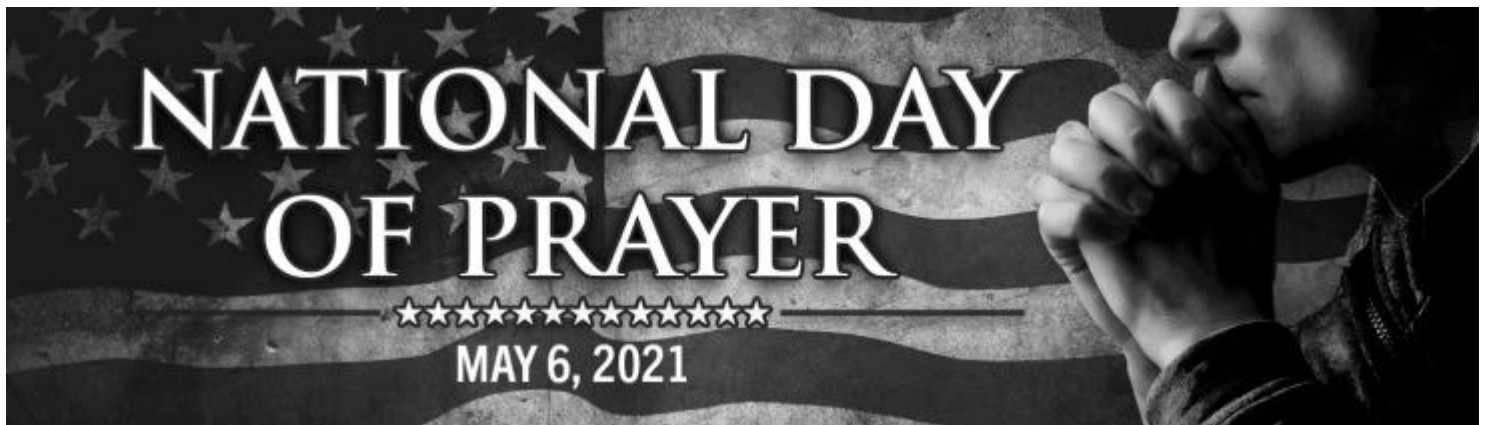

Note 1: 2021 Giving includes offerings during Worship and payments received in Church Office through the end of March. Values do not include special fund donations to ministries such as We Care, the Food Pantry, the Vineyard Fund, the Youth Group, and building projects. These donations were approximately \$270 per week through March 2021. Other sources of funds, such as outside contributions, Memorials, refunds, rebates, and transfers from the Congregational Fund, are also not included in the amounts.

Note 2: Attendance per week includes only in-person attendance. Comparable online attendance figures are not available for live-streamed services. 'Views' of recorded services ranged from 75 to 215.

Note 3: Budget figures are included as a comparison because the budget was the estimated amount voted on by the Congregation Membership to meet the Congregation's financial requirements during the year. Actual expenditures are available in the monthly accounting report distributed by the Treasurer.

Note 4: These amounts are presented for comparison purposes only. Our individual giving amount should be based on being faithful to the Lord so that we return a generous amount of the gifts He gave us.

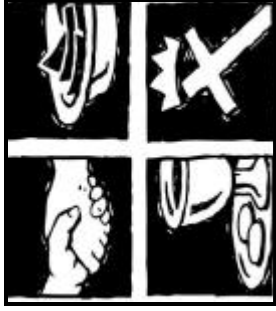

Hi from Your Parish Nurse!

Did you know that May is Better Hearing and Speech Month? I am going to discuss what happens to your hearing as you age, what causes hearing loss as you age, signs to watch for, who to see for hearing loss, treatments and how to protect your ears from hearing loss. Most people will gradually lose some of their hearing as they age. In the U.S. about one third of people age 65-74 have some hearing loss while almost half of those 75 and older have some difficulty hearing.

What causes it? Most of the time hearing loss with aging occurs the same way in both ears over time. It is usually due to the change in the ears over time. It typically affects the inner ear, but it can be due to injury to other parts of the body such as the auditory nerve (nerve for hearing) or even the brain can be involved. If you have sudden hearing loss it is important to see an ear/nose/throat (ENT) doctor as soon as possible.

It's not just about your age. Health conditions such as diabetes, ear infections that recur, and hypertension can affect your hearing as well. Some medications can affect hearing such as aspirin, chemotherapy and some antibiotics can affect your hearing. Loud sounds like music, lawn mowers, fireworks, gunfire, loud engines and planes can have an effect on your hearing. Finally, whether or not hearing loss runs in your family can influence your risk of hearing loss.

Signs to watch for: If hearing off you may have difficulty understanding words or following a conversation, especially in noisy places like a restaurant. You might have trouble making out consonants like "s", "t", "k", "p", and "f". You could have difficulty hearing high-pitched sounds like doorbells, phones and the beeps from thermometers when they are ready for you to read. Tinnitus or ringing in your ears may be present

Do you have a hearing problem? If you think so, check out these questions. 1) Are you embarrassed sometimes because you can't hear? 2) Does talking with friends/family frustrate you because you can't hear them? 3) Do you need to turn the TV or radio up louder than other people to hear it? 4) Do you feel that your hearing restricts or limits you in any way? If you answered yes to some of these questions and are concerned about your hearing it's time to get it checked.

If you are concerned about your hearing you should check with your doctor or primary care provider (PCP) first. It could be a case of ear wax that needs to be removed. Your PCP can refer specialists who can help you if needed. You might be referred to an ear/nose/throat (ENT) doctor to check your ears to see if there's a reason why you've lost some hearing besides aging. An audiologist is a health care professional trained in the diagnosis, treatment and management of hearing loss, balance disorders and other associated disorders. A hearing aid specialist can measure your hearing and fit you for a hearing aid if needed.

What else can help your hearing? Assistive listening devices can make things you need to hear louder like at theaters, airports and church. St. Mark has portable receivers to hear the service better. Just ask the person in the sound booth for them. When a person is talking pay particular attention to their mouth, lips and gestures. This can help you grasp more of what they are saying.

Don't be afraid to ask for help. Don't be reluctant to let friends and family and others know that you have some hearing loss. Here are some simple ways you and those around you can make hearing easier: Ask people to speak up and talk clearly without shouting. Ask people who are talking to you to make sure they are facing you so you can see their faces. Limit background noise at home. When out and about try to find quieter areas to talk with others.

It is very important to protect your hearing at all ages as there is no sure way to stop or slow hearing loss as we age. You can take steps to make sure you are not making matters worse by avoiding loud noises at work and in your free time. If you can't avoid loud noises wear ear plugs or ear muffs to protect your hearing when around loud noises such as lawnmowers, snow blowers, vacuums, small kitchen appliances, farm equipment and loud concerts.

Finally stay connected. Hearing loss is more than just about hearing. If you can't hear well, it makes it more difficult to enjoy activities such as movies, lectures, concerts worship and others. It can mean missing out on spending time with people you care about. It can help prevent feelings of isolation and depression so make your hearing a top priority.

Please contact me if you have questions about hearing loss or need resources for hearing loss in the community. I can help you and understand what you are going through as I have hearing loss in the higher decibels, but not quite enough for hearing aids. I grew up on a farm near loud machinery, went to a few loud concerts and around yard as well as home equipment that was loud. I have been protecting my ears since the hearing loss was detected with ear plugs and muffs.

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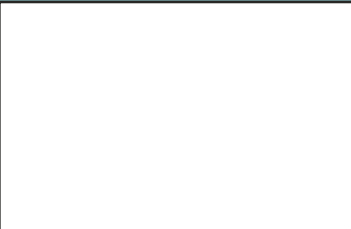
